\$1M Anonymous Gift

Shedding a spotlight on our hard-working and dedicated Dominican Hospital employees, we received a truly amazing gift from one of our generous donors of \$1 million.

As the donor wished, 100 percent of the gift was distributed in May 2020, to employees who met the qualifications, in gratitude for their hard work at the hospital during the COVID-19 pandemic.

COVID-19 Response

As a result of the pandemic, Dominican Hospital received an outpouring of support in both monetary and in-kind gifts. We have raised over \$1.1M and received more than 10,000 meals and 125,000 pieces of personal protective equipment (PPE) including masks, gloves, head-sets, disinfectants, and more.

In response, we have established two charitable funds to support emergency response during the COVID-19 pandemic and/or other crises.

The **Dominican Frontline Spirit Fund** will be used to bolster the spirits of our community of frontline health care providers at Dominican Hospital, who put themselves and their families at risk each and every day they come to work.

The **Dominican Emergency Preparedness Fund** provides necessary resources to care for our patients during a crisis—such as the current COVID-19 pandemic—through medical supplies, medical equipment, testing, additional staffing, and other unidentified needs that may arise.

A Place of Peace

Due to medical complications, Aptos resident Yuki Batterson was airlifted to Stanford Hospital promptly after she went into labor. There, she gave birth to identical twin girls, Hope and Naomi. However, during her pregnancy, doctors had tragically discovered that Hope would not survive long after she was born.

The twins were transferred to Dominican Hospital's advanced Level III Neonatal Intensive Care Unit (NICU) six days after they were delivered at Stanford—Hope for palliative care and Naomi for intermediate care for premature birth. "Dominican's NICU nurses traveled all the way to Stanford, showing up like angels, to come take us 'home' during the most difficult time of our lives," says Yuki. "It was also such a relief that we could be in our home with our other young daughters while we made the NICU trips, instead of in Palo Alto."

To honor Hope's memory and to show appreciation for the high quality of care she received during the 28 day stay in the NICU, Ben and Yuki, donated \$10,000 to the Dr. Joseph T. Anzalone Newborn Care Courtyard, which was matched by Ben's employer, Apple Inc. This gift names a bench in honor of Hope and Naomi, and sits near the room where Hope received care.

"We hope our donation helps bring a bit of much-needed fresh air and relief to both the families and staff of the NICU," adds Yuki. "Nature has a way of fixing everything."



Healing Courtyards

This fiscal year brings us to the completion of our Healing Courtyards Initiative which began in 2014 and raised \$4.4 million. We have officially broken ground on the two remaining courtyards, to be opened by this fall.

More than 630 community members, employees, physicians, businesses and foundations have donated to the project, providing soothing respite and therapeutic benefits.

Monterey Peninsula Foundation Rehabilitation Garden

This space was designed with the input of physical, occupational, and speech therapists to serve our patients in our Acute Rehabilitation Unit (ARU) who are recovering from stroke, neurosurgery, spinal cord injuries, or orthopedic surgery. The garden may also aid in recovery for patients with recent severe medical issues, amputations, or cardiac and oncology surgeries.

Norman and Maureen Benito Surgery Courtyard

This courtyard features a soothing pond with turtles and koi fish and private respite areas to reduce stress for visitors, as well as, patients recovering from surgery. The addition allows for an upstairs balcony expansion, significantly increasing the only outside space available to patients on the second floor.

The expanded Surgery Lounge, used by more than 50,000 people each year as the main waiting area for acute surgeries, allows for more space for families and loved ones. Designed with the input of surgeons and nurses, the lounge includes a private consult room where surgeons can report the outcomes of the surgery, ensuring patient privacy and an appropriate setting for sensitive communication.

Nello and Pam Santacroce Meditation Courtyard

This garden is designed as a quiet area for all hospital visitors, patients, and staff to focus on meditation, contemplation, and mindfulness as part of their therapeutic approach. A planted green wall alongside the relaxing sound of water flowing from a water wall promises calming and peaceful effects. This tranquil setting is inspired by the stunning redwoods of the Santa Cruz Mountains.

Dr. Joseph T. Anzalone Newborn Care Courtyard

Designed with the input from our nursing staff and community, this peaceful setting allows new parents and their babies to enjoy fresh air and nature, helping to relieve feelings of stress and exhaustion and celebrate new births. Also inspired by our surrounding landscape, the courtyard will include a green wall, three mosaic animal sculptures, rocking chairs, and a tile mural celebrating births in Santa Cruz County.

'Giving for Good" Employee Campaign

We had an excellent year in house-wide Employee Giving Campaign, especially in light of the COVID-19 interruption of our active phase of the employee-engagement Philanthropy Initiative.

This year we focused on developing a culture of giving year-round. Our goal was to raise \$150,000 from 450 employees who specifically gave through the employee giving campaign.

We surpassed our annual goal by raising \$154,680, with a total of 493 employee donors, which is nearly 30% of our staff!

We are very grateful that Dominican has such a generous and hardworking staff who are dedicated and excited to improving the well-being of the hospital.
