This past holiday season was very exciting for the Dominican Hospital Foundation. We had the most successful gala in our history raising more than \$417,000 for direct patient care. A special thanks to our 17 Annual Healthcare Sponsors who donated \$10,000-\$25,000 each to bring this event to a new level. We were able to allocate significant funding for our primary cause this year, the Healing Courtyards Initiative and expansion of our Main Surgery Waiting Area. Due to a two-to-one match from Lucile Packard Children's Hospital and the Krassow Family Foundation, we met our goal to purchase a new dual-purpose ultrasound machine for the Neonatal Intensive Care Unit.

We are also excited about the first Professional Advisors Council meeting, which you will read about in this issue. A special thanks to Michelle Anderson and Peter Sanford for gathering such a strong group. We are working hard to increase the number of Heritage Society members – those who have remembered Dominican Hospital in their will or trust.

Donations fund major projects, such as the new endoscopy suite which opened this spring. We also fund individual patients and their families who need support during a critical time. They are assisted through projects such as the Sydney Jackson Cancer Patient Support Fund. This fund, established by Foundation Board member Don Jackson, helps patients with essential needs. A similar fund has now been created for families with premature babies in the Neonatal Intensive Care Unit, and we also have a support fund for patients impacted by a stroke.

Receptions, tours, and lunches always bring people together and increase understanding of why community investments in our hospital are so important. A special thanks to Carol and Matt Lezin for hosting a home reception, which is highlighted in this issue. I invite you to join in and become involved. "Now we have the opportunity to provide this care in a specially designed, state-of-the-art environment. I am so touched by Don and Ida's inspirational generosity. Their gift impacts the lives of hundreds of patients for years to come."

More Than \$410,000 Raised for Patient Care at Dominican

Dominican Hospital Foundation welcomed nearly 600 guests to the two day Holidays d'Eleganz annual event, held on November 21 and 22. More than 60 sponsors supported this year's event.

"The community support for the Foundation has been growing over the last three years, which has had a positive impact on the care Dominican Hospital provides," said Jared Bogaard, Foundation Board member and Chair of the Holidays d'Eleganz committee. "Private support allows us to bring the latest technology and innovation to Dominican

Hospital. Every person in our community, regardless of income, should have access to the very best health care; our work at the Foundation aims to support this."

Proceeds from the event allowed the Foundation to purchase a new ultrasound system that serves as an echocardiogram for the Neonatal Intensive Care Unit (NICU) and Labor and Delivery.

"The new technology of this machine allows us to assess the hearts and vital organs of unborn babies, and helps detect any heart abnormalities before birth. This greatly

improves the outcome for babies with severe heart defects,” said Magdy Ismail, MD, medical director of the Dominican Hospital Neonatal Intensive Care Unit.

The Krassow family offered a \$25,000 match to raise funds for the ultrasound. The Krassows have generously donated to the NICU for several years.

“Having experienced the loss of our own grandson, we have seen firsthand the devastating impact that serious illness and death of an infant can have on parents, grandparents and extended family members. Our hope is that through this gift and the generous support of the community we can spare many local families the emotional and physical pain of the loss of an infant,” the Krassows said.

The event also supported the Healing Courtyards Initiative – a project to be funded primarily with private donations.

“Our vision is to create islands of peace and serenity in order to soften the stresses of hospital stays,” said Keith McKenzie, MD, chair of the Healing Courtyard Committee. In April the Healing Courtyard Committee approved a master plan designed by local landscape architect Joni Janecki & Associates. Plans include the remodel of the surgery waiting room and the adjacent garden; a Family Birthing Center garden that allows new moms and families to spend time outside with their infants; a meditation garden; and an Acute Rehabilitation garden where therapists can work with patients outside.

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Cancer Center Thrives

Cancer Rehab Program Optimizes Care

As part of the Mary and Richard Solari Cancer Center, a new cancer rehabilitation program is being developed at Dominican.

“The majority of cancer survivors have physical problems due to the various treatments they undergo. Many, if not most, survivors do not receive the rehabilitation services that would help them to physically and emotionally heal as quickly as possible,” says Kathy Finnigan, manager of oncology services.

The cancer rehabilitation program will provide patients with a comprehensive, coordinated rehabilitation plan supported by a group of physicians, nurses, physical therapists, occupational therapists, speech-language pathologists, registered dietitians, and mental health professionals. Each team member addresses a different aspect of rehabilitation, helping all cancer survivors heal optimally, both physically and emotionally, whether they are cured,

in remission, or living with cancer as a chronic condition. The team at Dominican is currently going through a process to become certified in Survivorship Training and Rehabilitation, an evidence-based training in oncology rehabilitation for hospital interdisciplinary teams.

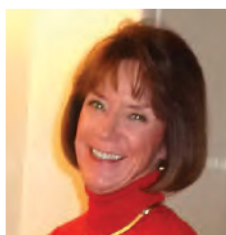
“Dominican has a longstanding commitment to providing the best possible care for people undergoing cancer treatment. We will be one of the first on the Central Coast to offer this nationally recognized rehabilitation program,” says Dr. Michael Alexander, medical director of the Mary and Richard Solari Cancer Center. “Survivorship has become part of our certification as an American College of Surgeon’s Cancer Center. It is also a major focus of the American Society of Clinical Oncology.”

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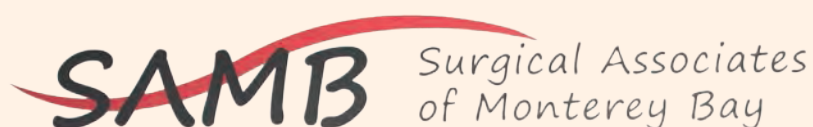

Santa Cruz Surgery Center



Santa Cruz Surgery Center (SCSC) is one of the oldest freestanding surgery centers in California, founded in 1989 through a partnership with Dominican Hospital and a group of local physicians. With more than 90 physicians on staff, all of whom also work at Dominican, the center offers significantly lower pricing than other facilities in the area. The unique partnership between the hospital and the surgery center allows for much faster treatment and coordinated care.

“When I perform a colonoscopy and encounter a suspect malignancy, I can have the patient directly admitted to Dominican for a CT scan and get them to operating room sooner,” said Dr. Brian Waddle, partner and a board member of SCSC. “Working concertedly with the gastroenterologists we are able to streamline patient care.”

Dr. Waddle specializes in general, laparoscopic and thoracic surgery. He is one of 10 physicians at SCSC that perform gastrointestinal (“GI”) procedures, which include diagnostic colonoscopy, upper and lower endoscopy, and polyp biopsies.

The endoscopy program between SCSC and Dominican will be further enhanced with the new endoscopy suite at the hospital. State-of-

the-art intervention technology in the suite includes an endoscopic ultrasound (EUS) that uses high-frequency sound waves to produce detailed images of the lining and walls of the digestive tract chest and nearby organs such as the pancreas, liver, and lymph nodes.

“EUS was not available in Santa Cruz before and patients had to go over the hill, which would result in almost a two-week delay in treatment,” said Dr. Waddle. “Having this technology here will allow us to treat patients with rectal cancer in a more expeditious manner resulting in better outcomes.”

With more than 2,000 GI procedures performed at SCSC last year and now the new equipment at Dominican Hospital, the two partners will become the number one choice for gastrointestinal treatments in Santa Cruz.

“The dividends from the partnership have allowed our center to attract great doctors to our community,” he said.

Grateful Family Gives Back

What started out as a leisurely afternoon ice cream outing ended in the emergency room for the Zeltser-Fitch family. James Fitch was carrying his 18-month-old son, Zachary, when James suddenly tripped and fell on the pavement, baby still in his hands.

In the ER, Greg Whitley, MD, saw blood in one of Zachary's ears and immediately took action. Scans were taken of his head and were then sent to the lead pediatric neurologist at Lucile Packard Children's Hospital at Stanford to check for trauma and brain damage.

"Dr. Whitley was amazing. He balanced being very concerned and very calm at the same time. His demeanor and proficiency ensured to us that everything possible was being done for our son, and he was in the best possible care," says Alla, Zachary's mom.

In less than an hour, the pediatric neurologist reported back to Dr. Whitley. Zachary had a skull fracture but no brain trauma. After consulting closely with the family, Dr. Whitley ensured them that it was safe for Zachary to go home.

"I felt so relieved," Alla said. "It was incredible to be able to go home with a feeling of security and comfort that one of the world's top experts in pediatric neurology said that our child was going to be just fine. I am so grateful that Dominican Hospital has built those relationships with top medical experts around the country. Without these partnerships, our baby would have had to be transferred to Stanford by ambulance or airlifted, both of which would have been traumatic and added hours onto the time before he received care."



"The level of care we received at Dominican was amazing. The nurses were highly trained, fast, and responsive. There was constant communication about what was happening with Zachary and what the next step was going to be. We were so grateful to Dr. Whitley, too. His shift ended at midnight but he stayed with us until almost 3 a.m. to ensure that Zachary was totally taken care of and we were comfortable with taking him home," says James Fitch.

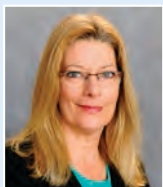
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
